




YOUR PROPERTY TAX BREAK DOWN:






YOUR SALES TAX PERCENT IN OZARK IS: 8.35%

WHAT PERCENTAGE OF YOUR ONLINE SALES TAX GOES TO THE CITY OF OZARK?




COMMUNICATIONS DEPARTMENT

The Communications Department for the city of Ozark serves as the primary liaison between the municipal government and the community, ensuring effective and transparent communication. Their duties include managing public relations, disseminating crucial information through multiple channels such as social media, press releases, and newsletters, and coordinating outreach efforts to engage residents in civic activities and initiatives. Additionally, they oversee the city's website and digital platforms to provide up-to-date information on services, events, and policies. 

CITY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE

The Law Department assists the Mayor, Board of Aldermen, City Administrator, and all City Departments with municipal law matters. The City Attorney works on a daily basis as the attorney for the City.

WHAT DOES THE CITY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE DO FOR THE CITY OF OZARK?

- Provides legal services and advice pertaining to city business and issues
- Negotiates and drafts contracts
- Prepares legal documents such as ordinances, resolutions, and deeds
- Represents the city in all legal matters
- Performs legal research and legal analysis and provides legal advice to City officials and staff



The municipal legal practice covers a wide selection of legal issues, including constitutional law, land use law, contract law, human resources/personnel law, and more.



The Law Department serves in a supportive capacity to all departments and elected officials and strives to use that role to make Ozark better every day!


HUMAN RESOURCES

EMPLOYEE TENURE








WATER UTILITY BILLING DIVISION



The Utility Billing Department for the City of Ozark is responsible for managing and processing utility bills for residents and businesses in the city. Its main goal is to ensure accurate billing and timely collection of payments for water, sewer, and trash services. The department handles a variety of tasks, such as setting up new accounts, processing payments, issuing bills, and addressing customer inquiries and concerns.








PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

This dedicated team oversees the upkeep of the vast infrastructure that makes up the City of Ozark, including 150 miles of sanitary sewer mains, 3,578 sewer manholes, 196 miles of streets, 40 miles of storm sewer pipes and culverts, and 34 buildings and facilities.

They are responsible for the success of the city's waste management, infrastructure safety, and transportation of our citizens. The department and the employees ensure compliance with various regulatory agencies such as the Missouri Department of Natural Resources (MDNR), Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), etc.

GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEM (GIS) & ADMINISTRATION

In the past year, the City of Ozark Public Works has made significant strides in modernizing our operations. We successfully transitioned to a new access management software to enhance our ability to manage resources and services efficiently. Additionally, we revamped and simplified our purchase order process, promoting greater transparency and accountability in financial transactions.

Furthermore, we diligently gathered GPS data for 7,000 water meters better utilizing our GIS Software, improving our ability to monitor and maintain our water infrastructure. Moreover, we collected grid coordinates to update the City of Ozark Mapping System, ensuring accurate and up-to-date geographical information for better city planning and service delivery. These initiatives demonstrate our commitment to innovation and excellence in serving the community.

SEWER & WASTE WATER DIVISION

We completed various upgrades and maintenance tasks within our wastewater infrastructure in 2023, enhancing efficiency and security. This included installing SCADA security panels at lift stations and the Elk Valley Wastewater Plant and a new fine screen at the North Plant. Additionally, we installed permanent flow meters at our four largest lift stations and performed Cast-In-Place-Piping (CIPP) for 5,068 feet of sewer main. To ensure comprehensive maintenance, we recorded CCTV footage of over 34,353 feet of sewer main and repaired service lateral connections for 89 homes.

STREET MAINTENANCE

Over the past year, our infrastructure maintenance and management efforts have been substantial. We conducted street sweeping across an impressive span of 2,000 miles while also addressing road integrity by crack sealing 9.3 miles of roadway. To enhance our winter services, we introduced a new snow removal policy. Additionally, we efficiently processed and fulfilled 3,128 work orders, ensuring the timely and effective execution of tasks.


WATER DIVISION

In 2023, the Public Works department achieved significant milestones aimed at enhancing water infrastructure and service reliability. We diligently cleaned the interiors and exteriors of water towers, ensuring optimal water quality and system integrity. Introducing a modernization initiative, we commenced the installation of wirelessly connected "I-hydrants," a step towards advanced hydrant management.

Moreover, our strategic infrastructure improvements included the implementation of water main looping at critical locations such as Hall Street near Riverview Residential Place, Walmart to Oak Hill, and Mullberry to Town and Country near B&B Theaters, effectively reducing the likelihood of outages and ensuring continued service reliability for our community.

2023 COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

Throughout the year, Ozark has actively engaged in community initiatives to enhance the local environment and foster a sense of civic pride. Collaborating with the James River Basin Partnership, we organized a successful clean-up event along the Finley River, effectively removing trash and debris to preserve the natural beauty of the waterway. Additionally, our partnership with Ozark Public Schools included the Adopt-A-Class program and a street sweeper art contest, promoting environmental awareness among students. Furthermore, we provided crucial support for various special events such as the Duck Race, Craft Fair, Concerts, and Rodeos, enriching community life. Collaborating with the Historic River District and Christian County Master Gardeners, we played a pivotal role in establishing planters at the Innovations Center, contributing to the beautification of our city. Moreover, our efforts extended to staging enchanting Christmas lights in Finley River Park, spreading festive cheer and bringing joy to residents and visitors alike.



TREE CITY USA

For the 16th consecutive year, The City of Ozark proudly upholds its dedication to environmental stewardship by being honored once again as a Tree City USA. This esteemed accolade underscores the city's ongoing commitment to conservation and sustainability practices. Beyond the aesthetic charm, being recognized as a Tree City USA emphasizes Ozark's proactive efforts in nurturing a greener, healthier environment. Residents within Tree City USA communities enjoy tangible advantages, including cleaner air and an improved quality of life. Ozark's continued designation as a Tree City USA symbolizes its steadfast commitment to fostering a vibrant ecosystem for present and future generations alike.









NATURAL DISASTER DECLARATION 2023

In the aftermath of severe weather events, their swift action ensures the safe collection and disposal of debris, providing a crucial service to residents. Remarkably, the team successfully collected and disposed of an astounding 8,000 cubic yards of debris, showcasing their efficiency and commitment to keeping Ozark clean and safe.



PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT



The Planning & Development Department of the City of Ozark is responsible for ensuring that land use and development within the city are consistent with the city's zoning and development regulations. Its main goal is to promote responsible and sustainable growth and development within Ozark. The department handles a variety of tasks, such as reviewing development proposals, issuing permits, conducting zoning and land use studies, and providing guidance to property owners and developers on land use and development regulations.



ONWARD OZARK: PLANNING OUR CORRIDORS

In 2023, the City of Ozark, in conjunction with Olsson Studios, started the process of creating a corridor plan for three of the major commercial corridors in Ozark. This plan will encompass the right-of-way of the following roads as well as the adjacent parcels.

- North State Highway NN Corridor: (starts as S. 9th Street) extends from the 3rd Street/Highway 14 intersection to the West State Highway J intersection.
- South 3rd Street Corridor: extends from the South Street intersection to the N. 9th Street intersection.
- South Street Corridor: extends from the Highway 65 intersection to the Highway W intersection.

The corridor plan will guide future growth and development, aesthetics and character, and services located along three corridors in Ozark. During this process, the consultants and staff will take a holistic look at the different types of transportation, the land uses of the nearby parcels, infrastructure, and demographic and market trends for the area.

Another large component of the planning process is to collect community input about what they want for the future of these corridors. A community survey was conducted in October 2023, and over 500 surveys were submitted by Ozark residents and stakeholders. The planning process is still ongoing, with the projected adoption of the plan occurring in late summer/early fall. There are additional opportunities for public input still to come. 







BUILDING INSPECTIONS




CODE ENFORCEMENT

HIGHLIGHTS OF COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENTS THAT RECEIVED A **CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY IN 2023:**

Commercial New and Infill permits are a collaborative process between a number of different parties: the owner, architects, engineers, road districts, utility providers, Ozark Fire District, and the Public Works and Planning and Developments. In addition to reviewing plans, the Fire District, Public Works, and Planning Departments all conduct inspections throughout the building process.

This new structure is in the Ozark Centre commercial subdivision. It was built on the lot that previously had a Russel Stover store located on it. The city worked with the developer to complete an administrative lot split to allow two businesses to be located in this space




PARKS & RECREATION

The City of Ozark's Parks and Recreation Department is responsible for providing and maintaining parks, trails, and recreational facilities for the community. Its main goal is to enhance the quality of life for citizens by promoting active and healthy lifestyles through various recreational activities. The department is responsible for planning and organizing events, managing parks and trails, maintaining sports facilities, and providing recreational programs and activities for people of all ages.

2023 SUMMER CAMPS

Summer Camp 2023 consisted of 316 campers over the course of 61 days, with 48 staff, 198 field trips, five buses, and many memories made! Daily attendance averages increased by three children over 2022 numbers and 33 over 2018 numbers. Summer attendance is at its max, with the waitlist hitting all-time highs of 146 children desiring to be admitted to Camp, but there is no space at this time.



















2 % of traffic stops conducted by the Ozark Police Department were on County Roads or Private Property.
